A Community Holiday Tree for Westport is coming to town! And if it isn't up already, it will be soon. The idea to put up a town tree this Holiday season was born at the last Community Center Committee meeting and through the hard work of a few community members, will be a reality. Keep an eye on the lot across from the Westport Store (at Abalone St. and Highway 1) for a 20-foot tree awaiting adornment. We'll get the lights and a topper on it, but

we need the help of the community to finish it. If you'd like to donate an ornament or two or more, you can leave your donations at the Recreation Center (formerly the Westport School) – look for a tub by the door. We'll get the ornaments up on the top portion of the tree, and you can come a little early (starting around 4:00PM) to the tree lighting and personally add your ornaments to the bottom (reachable) portion of the tree. We'll do the official tree lighting on the same evening as the kids' Holiday festivities (see below), on Friday, December 12<sup>th</sup> at 5:00PM. The kids will be coming down between 4:00 and 4:30PM to add any ornaments they've made, then will stay for the tree lighting before retreating to watch Christmas movies in the warmth of the Recreation Center.

## Westport Community Church December – January Calendar

The Westport Community Church is pleased to offer a variety of experiences to help us discover ways to become more in touch with our spiritual heritage. We are doing our best to nurture a tradition of having weekly gatherings at the Church to explore various spiritual paths. All suggestions and participants for services are welcome at the Westport Church – and we welcome all denominations to hold services here!

December will bring to our village's Church a wonderful offering on **every Sunday this month beginning at 10:00AM**. So far we also have a program scheduled for Sunday, January 11<sup>th</sup> at 10:00AM. Descriptions of our upcoming services are as follows:

### December 7<sup>th</sup> – Rabbi Margaret Holub

Margaret has been the Rabbi of the Mendocino Coast Jewish Community since 1989. A Jewish community is a little different than a church or another kind of faith community in that it is a place of community for Jewish people and others who may express their spirituality in many different ways. Sometimes I think of MCJC as a place of many conversations: religious, secular, cultural, emotional, intellectual, political, mystical, practical... Hopefully all of this exploration leads to more love and more kindness, towards each other, in our local community and in our world.

So the effort that you are all making in Westport to foster a place for spiritual sharing seems right in step with things I care about very much! I'm planning to lead a very short morning service with some Hebrew singing (don't worry!) and prayer, then just stick around to talk about Judaism and anything else that might come up. I thank you all very much for this invitation.

### **December 14<sup>th</sup> – Dr. Steven Doyle, Center for Spiritual Living**

Steven will speak on The Perennial Philosophy, a practice that presents the spiritual seeker with paths which can lead to awakening. Dr. Doyle has studied the ancient Hindu texts for five decades. After the talk we can have a question and answer session along with discussion of the book.

Steven Doyle, Ph.D. has trained in Ericksonian hypnosis, Movement therapy and Shamanic practices. He has lead seminars in hypnosis, and many other healing modalities in the Western states and Hawaii over the past 40 years.

### **December 21<sup>st</sup> – Our Monthly Quaker Worship Group**

Katherine White is helping us to establish an ongoing Quaker Worship Group meeting on the third Sunday of every month. The format is a simple, quiet meditation for 45 minutes followed by Katherine reading Quaker passages and a shared discussion of our experience including sharing of any of our thoughts or readings that one is inspired to bring to the group. This has been and will continue to be a very peace-filled and nurturing experience.

### **December 28<sup>th</sup> – Mettika Hoffman, Fort Bragg Buddhist Sanga, Three Jewels Hall**

Mettika will present the Buddha's teaching regarding pointers for "right speech". The morning will begin with a simple guided meditation which is appropriate for beginners as well as those who have already tried meditation. Meditation cultivates awareness of the present moment of here and now. After the 20-minute guided meditation there will a Dharma talk pointing to the Buddhist teachings that using skillful speech may prevent unhappiness. In a nutshell, the test of skillful speech is to stop and ask yourself before you

speak: Is it true? Is it kind? Is it beneficial? Does it harm anyone? Is this the right time to say something?

### **January 11<sup>th</sup> – Carolyn Cathey, "Spiritual Healing through Love and Law"**

Love and Law. They sound opposite, don't they? Love is soft and Law is rigid. Love is emotional. Law is unfeeling. Love is creative. Law is robotic. But if Love and Law are put together, and followed wisely, Spiritual healing occurs and lives are enriched.

Carolyn Cathey, Student Practitioner at the Mendocino Center for Spiritual Living, sheds light on the significance of Love and Law, why they matter, and how we can use these tools for healing in our lives.

## Westport Volunteer Fire Department News

Dear Westport and surrounding area residents,

The Westport Volunteer Fire Department (WVFD) thanks all of you for your time helping out at our fundraising events and for your monetary donations. We really appreciate your generosity. WVFD provides the first response to structure fires, wildland fires, vehicle accidents, rescues, and medical emergencies within our response area, 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. We constantly strive to be well equipped and well trained.

We now have 3 new Firefighters who will be taking the 160-hour EMT training this Spring – please welcome John Allison, Glenn Jones, and Jeff Mathias to the Westport Fire and Rescue team! Also, Lin Taylor-Maurice has returned to WVFD as an EMT and as our Chaplain after pursuing and obtaining her PhD in Holistic Ministry. Our firefighters recently attended an all-day training on Saturday the 22nd of November on CPR, AED use and First Aid, which gave them the opportunity to learn and practice the updated protocols for responding to medical emergencies.

This past summer, we conducted engine pump tests and hose tests, and completed pre-fire plans for the 19 commercial buildings in and around Westport. The results were submitted to ISO, which is the organization that audits fire departments for insurance rating purposes. We hope the results will help all of us get better insurance rates.

While all of us at WVFD are unpaid volunteers, training, vehicle maintenance, equipment, and building repairs all cost money. We rely on our fundraisers and your donations to cover our expenses. **We ask you all to consider making an additional year-end contribution to WVFD by sending a monetary donation to Westport Volunteer Fire and Rescue, P. O. Box 63, Westport, CA 95488.** We are a 501c3 nonprofit (EIN: 32-0204441), and donations are tax deductible. All of us at Westport Fire hope every one of you had a warm and Happy Thanksgiving and wish you a wonderful Holiday Season! Thank you!

## Holiday Recipes

### Miniature Maryland Crab Cakes

1 lb. lump fresh crab meat  
 1 egg  
 ½ cup bread crumbs  
 2 Tbsp. chopped green sweet pepper  
 2 Tbsp. chopped red sweet pepper  
 ¼ cup mayonnaise  
 1 Tbsp. finely chopped parsley  
 Dash salt  
 Pepper and Cayenne pepper

Pick over crabmeat to remove shells or cartilage, being careful not to shred crabmeat. It should remain in lumps. Sprinkle red and green pepper over crabmeat. Lightly toss crabmeat with egg, mayonnaise, and seasonings. Slowly sprinkle bread crumbs into mixture. It should be moist, with no trace of crumbs. Form into small cakes and lightly sauté in melted butter until lightly browned. (Please note: Do not use frozen crabmeat in this recipe.)

## Apple Cider Pot Roast

- 1 tsp. Fresh ginger, grated
- 1 tsp. Salt
- ¼ tsp. Pepper
- 1 (4-4½ lb.) rump roast
- 2 slices bacon, uncooked
- 1 Tbsp. Butter
- 1 Tbsp. Oil
- ¾ cup chopped onion
- 1 carrot, minced
- 1 stalk celery, minced
- 1-1½ cup hard cider
- 1 (10-1½ oz.) can beef broth
- 1 clove garlic

Combine ginger, salt, and pepper; rub over meat. Let stand 30 minutes. Coat meat lightly with flour. Place bacon, butter, and oil in a Dutch oven. Saute until bacon is brown. Add meat to pan. Cook until all sides are brown. Add celery, carrot, and onion. Saute for 5 minutes. Add cider, broth, and garlic. Simmer, turning occasionally, about 2-1¼ hours. Sauce can be thickened if you wish a gravy. Serves 6.

## Time And Tide

*“Sun sure is going down early these days, yup, yup.”*  
And indeed it is, but it’s going down early sooner than you think!

Our **Winter Solstice** is coming up on **December 21<sup>st</sup> at 3:03PM**, and that’s the shortest day of the year in Westport, right? Well, if you’ve got Holiday company, it might actually seem like the *longest* day of the year – but yes, it is technically the shortest day here at 9 hours and 22 minutes between the “official” sunrise at 7:32AM and the “official” sunset at 4:54PM (more about that later).

So if December 21<sup>st</sup> is the shortest day of the year, it’s also the day when the sun rises the latest and the sun sets the earliest, right? Well, not exactly. In reality, our latest sunrise won’t happen until January 6<sup>th</sup>, and our earliest sunset will actually be on December 7<sup>th</sup>. This is because of two key concepts: the Equation of Time and the Declination of The Sun. And you’ve just gotten your first Christmas present, because I won’t go into those concepts right now. (But you can read more about them if you want to at [www.timeanddate.com](http://www.timeanddate.com), which is a fun place to watch the world go around, especially if you like numbers.)

So here’s the rundown: the earliest sunset of the year in Westport will be on December 7<sup>th</sup> at 4:51PM (sorry I don’t have the time in seconds – since actually all the days from December 2<sup>nd</sup> through December 13<sup>th</sup> are listed with a 4:51PM sunset. By December 21<sup>st</sup>, the sun won’t go down until 4:54PM. And

conversely, the latest sunrise of the year will be on January 6<sup>th</sup> at 7:36AM (actually, all days from January 1<sup>st</sup> through January 10<sup>th</sup> are listed at 7:36AM), which is nearly 4 minutes later than December 21<sup>st</sup>, when the sun will rise at 7:32AM. Now you can tell all your friends that the latest sunrise day and the earliest sunset day in Westport both have official day lengths over 7 minutes longer than our shortest day of the year. Try it – it’s a great conversation stopper!

Some of you intuitive types might be wondering what all these “official” sunrise and sunset times even mean. In fact, your personal sunrise can be much later if you’ve got a big mountain in the way of the southeastern horizon (or if you sleep in late). For many of us in Westport, “official” sunset times are a bit more useful, especially if you’ve got a clear sky over the ocean, and I hope your company gets to see a few of those. Anyway, here’s hoping that your days during this Holiday Season are just as long as you want them to be!


