Back in the early days the coast highway was Route 56. Section 56A was to the south at Gualala and Section 56G was north near Leggett. The Westport vicinity was in Section 56F. This image (at left) that may interest you is the 1933 view of the slide north of Chadbourne Gulch. Back then the "highway" was a one lane gravel track, not much different than when it was first constructed. The County built this coast road in the 1870s as an overland route for wagons and stagecoaches extending north from Kibesillah to Westport. It was adopted as a state highway in the early 1930s.

The second image (below) was taken from the driveway of the Fee Mansion looking north on January 11, 1962. The old elementary school is prominent on the hill to the right. By this time the old school was superseded by a new one that stood across the highway from the Westport Inn, north of the Westport Store. Welcome to a wrinkle in time!

### **News About Trails**

The WVS is looking for volunteers to help with maintenance on two well-loved local trails. State Parks would appreciate our assistance trimming vegetation and repairing the stairs down to Pete's Beach. We also have obtained an encroachment permit from Caltrans and permission from the Mendocino Land Trust to do some brush trimming on the historic trail that goes northwest from the Caltrans parking lot at the south end of the Ten Mile Bridge to the Haul Road. Part of the work is already completed, but more brush trimming is desirable. If you'd like to help, please call me at 964-7272.

In other trail news, have you checked out the Kibesillah Bluff spur trail yet? The parking lot on Highway 1 was completed a few months ago, but the trail out to a viewing platform at the bluff edge just opened recently. It is well worth the short walk to the viewing platform, which has comfortable redwood benches. The views from there are breathtaking. From the Kibesillah Bluff viewing platform you can get a little taste for history if you have a good imagination.

To the north are the massive reefs that are the submerged northern end of the first coastal terrace (there are three in the local marine terraces here compared to five present further south at Caspar). These reefs were a major attraction for Native Americans for thousands of years. The buildings to the north occupy an area where the first major settlement of colonists was established at Kibesillah in the 1860s. To the south near the Newport Inn the old Newport Landing once stood.

# Not-So-Fearless Winter Weather Forecast

Traditionally, I have my Fearless Winter Weather Forecast ready by September, or at least by October. But no one ever said that long-range weather forecasting was easy. Last year, with its on-again-off-again El Nino, was maddening – but I still got our

annual rainfall total pretty close (I predicted 55 inches at least, and we ended up with 52 inches here on the Headlands).

I actually did have my Fearless Forecast ready this year in September, but it was so unbelievably boring ("Will it rain? Mebbe, mebbe not") that I didn't print it. In the interest of better forecasting, I decided to wait a couple of months to see what happened. You can't go wrong forecasting something that's already happened.

This past summer, we transitioned to more ENSOneutral conditions, so this is the year we were supposed to be back to a "normal" rainy season. Whatever that is. Naturally, we promptly hauled off and got over 18 inches of rain in October and November alone (that's over 40% of our annual rainfall total in just 2 months). This fact has now allowed me to predict that Westport will have a rainy fall, and also that Donald Trump will win the state of Michigan by a little over 10,000 votes (that's before the recount).

What happened? Well, in this column I'm only dealing with weather, but as far as the weather goes, a weak La Nina showed up this fall, which for the West Coast means wetter in the north and drier in the south, and we got the tail end of the tons of rain they've had in the Pacific Northwest. Is a rainy fall in Westport normal? Well, if you talk to some of the old-timers, it used to rain a lot here in the fall. And that's fine with me, since after a long dry summer, that's when our plants need rain the most. About the only instance when fall rains aren't welcome is if you start a major road construction project in October, but that's another story.

OK, so how about this winter? Well, since it hasn't happened yet, that's mighty hard to predict. If we can keep up this La Nina thing for another 4 months, we'll have 54 inches of rain total by the end of March (our average annual rainfall total here on the Headlands is around 43 inches). That's more than we got out of El Nino! Or, we could see a mid-winter shift to more ENSO-neutral conditions, and it could be a little drier than that. I do think that we will get more cool nights this winter than in recent years, and maybe even a little dusting of snow in our hills at some point. That would be fun. I'll have another weather forecast for you in a couple of months, after we know what actually happened. That's really the best way to predict anything these days!

# Are You Connected? Support Your Local Broadband Service!

(Editor's Note: For many years now, the only highspeed Internet service in Westport has been by satellite, but now there is a new kind of high-speed service here that merits our attention. So I asked Trish Steel of SeaKay to tell us about this service, and I told her to give us as much information as possible. That she did, and this is really interesting stuff! Like others have around here, I think I might just try SeaKay, and maybe you might want to as well.)

The great advantages of living a rural lifestyle are well known to all of us - no traffic, clean air, natural beauty, no crowds of people. It's probably why we all live here, despite the many (also well-known) disadvantages. However, one major disadvantage of living here has recently been overcome, for Westport residents now have the option for quality, affordable, and high-speed broadband. SeaKay, a non-profit community networking organization, has filled this need by expanding their network to offer their broadband service. They are already providing the Westport Store with free public wi-fi, and for the affordable rate of only \$45/month, you can receive unlimited, high-speed, low latency, reliable broadband. This is quite different from the higherpriced, data-limited and high-latency satellite or cellular that has been the only option for many residents until now. Best of all, SeaKay is a locally owned and operated and provides this service with no contract or hidden fees. One local Westport resident reported, "I am on SeaKay's service and it is wonderful."

SeaKay needs your support to continue and expand service throughout our community. Right now they only have a small number of households that are subscribers. The current small customer subscriber base may not be sustainable given the operating costs of the network. Broadband opens up so many possibilities for residents, from putting your business online to online educational opportunities to streaming Netflix (or for the more politically-minded, our Board of Supervisors meetings). Tourists want to stay in places where they can keep in touch with family and share their photos of our beautiful ocean views. Broadband access increases the value of your property. We are asking for your support to make sure that all your neighbors know about this service, and encourage them to go to our website at seakaybroadband.net and sign up. Or if you don't have online access, give us a call at 707-376-1234 and we will set you up. A good thing has been started...let's keep it going!

#### **Question and Answers:**

Q: How exactly does SeaKay's Fixed Wireless service work? SeaKay Broadband operates a hybrid fiber optic and wireless network to bring high-speed connectivity to our subscribers. We purchase wholesale bandwidth from carrier-neutral datacenters in the San Francisco Bay Area (just like Google and Amazon does) and transport bandwidth north to Ukiah via leased fiber optic lines. At our Network Operations Center (NOC) in Ukiah, we use highspeed point-to-point wireless links to a number of mountain-top distribution points. From these mountaintops, we directly feed other distribution points and also provide wireless service directly to subscribers who have installed a small-sized antennae on their roof (between 6" and 24" in size). From there the signal is brought inside your home to your

computer, or if desired, directed through a router to a wifi signal. Since a line of sight from your rooftop to a relay is required for service, a site visit is necessary to confirm that service is indeed available.

# **Q:** How reliable is it? Does weather and other factors (corrosion) affect service? Is there a maintenance plan?

Fixed Wireless service is extremely reliable and is not affected by weather such as rain, fog, and clouds. And SeaKay Broadband was not affected by any of the recent ATT outages. A majority of our relay sites are solar-powered, which makes for a reliable and sustainable way to power our equipment. Most customer-side equipment installed on SeaKay's coastal network is made of plastic and stainless steel to help extend it's life. SeaKay retains ownership of customer-side equipment and replaces it, free of charge, if it fails. Technicians reside in Mendocino County and in the event of any problems, technicians can be contacted by phone or email (information readily available on our website). We have a solid, standard service agreement policy which you can find on our website as well. Basically, if it's our fault we fix it free of charge, if it's your fault there is a standard hourly rate that is applied.

# **Q:** What are the Internet speeds and costs? Is there an installation fee?

SeaKay offers four speed tiers, with the lowest starting at 4 Mbps download and 2 Mbps upload for \$45/month, which is fully capable of handling Netflix and video. Service tiers are outlined here: http://seakaybroadband.net/services/residential-andsmall-business-internet-services/ All speeds have the extremely important quality of low latency which greatly affects your internet experience. In fact latency is so important that it deserves its own discussion, which you will find next. SeaKay Internet comes with unlimited data, so you won't ever pay penalties, have your service slowed down or have to monitor your usage when the grandkids visit. In addition, we are committed to protecting your privacy and personal data (not all companies are!). There is no contract, and only a one-time standard installation/equipment fee of \$150.

#### Q: So...what is the big deal about latency?

There is more to an Internet connection than just bandwidth (speed), there is latency. Latency is how long it takes data to travel between its source and destination, and is measured in milliseconds (MS) or "ping" when it's round trip. Satellite ping is typically 500~800 MS, while fixed wireless is typically ~30 MS. Latency manifests as a delay, and this can make a satellite Internet service rated at 20 Mbps with high latency can perform noticeably worse than a fixed wireless service rated at 5 Mbps and low latency. You won't hear satellite providers talking about latency for this reason.

Imagine you have a satellite connection and are sitting at your computer and you click a link. The request for the website goes out from the computer to the modem, out to your dish and transmits to a satellite 22,000 miles away in space. From there the signal bounces back down to earth to the company's ground-based station, called a gateway. From the gateway the signal travels along the terrestrial system connected with the Internet, grabs the data from the website, and takes it back to the gateway, which shoots it back up into space to the satellite, which then shoots it back down to the consumer's home. This means a signal often travels about 90,000 miles (depending on how far the ground terrestrial network is). Although it's pretty amazing and seems to happen quickly, in digital time... it's slow. It's hard for technology to beat physics.

The problem is then compounded by the way today's webpages load. There is not just one request for data, but rather many, often hundreds. You make the first hit to a page, and pay your first latency. Then that HTML calls for perhaps a dozen other downloads. Your second payment. Some of those will call for further downloads, giving you your third, and so on. With https this is all doubled due to the encryption protocol. Each request involves a round trip and each latency adds up and results in a delay. If you were having a skype-chat with a friend with such a connection, you would be out of sync with each other. Such delays make online applications such as videoconferencing, telecommuting (remote logins often fails) and gaming impossible. # **Q:** I've been hearing the wireless signal nullifies some types of cell-phone reception. Is this true?

There is no truth to this whatsoever. Mobile phones use the licensed 700-800 MHz frequency (Verizon, USC, ATT) and 1.7-2.1Ghz (T-Mobile, Metro PCS). SeaKay Broadband operates primarily in the 5.15-5.85Ghz unlicensed bands and sometimes in the 900Mhz band. These frequencies do not overlap and do not interfere with each other.

# **Q:** Why should I pay to break my satellite contract and switch?

There are very good quality, community and economic reasons to switch from satellite serve to SeaKay's Fixed Wireless service. Quality Reasons: Satellite Internet is not considered "broadband" by the California Public Utilities Commission, due to the high latency. Satellite was designed for those without any other options and while it's definitely better than dial-up, even "high speed" can be experienced as slow. Experiment for yourself - use a friend's low-latency broadband and see how it compares to your high-latency Internet. Satellite service can also be influenced by weather and sunspot activity, which do not affect fixed wireless service. With satellite you are disadvantaged for certain applications, and even though you may think you don't have a need to Skype for example, you may want to when family travels to Europe, or when that grandbaby across the county arrives. More possibilities and options are open to you when you are on true broadband, and you won't have to pass up such opportunities. You can change levels of service with a phone call, and as needs change SeaKay can change with it. Satellite has limited capacity in terms of bandwidth (maxed out at about 14 Mbps) and number of customers, and satellites can quickly become over-subscribed. This is why most satellite plans have data caps. Speeds that had been fairly consistent can suddenly drop as more customers are added to the satellite. Airplanes offering "onboard internet" use these satellites which can also cause unexpected congestion. When a satellite reaches capacity, it cannot be easily upgraded since that involves launching new satellites into orbit. Individual data usage is only going up, and so these issues can be expected to increase. Fixed Wireless

can easily scale to reach faster speeds, and the technology is improving all the time.

Community reasons: More subscribers make for a stronger network, both in terms of quality and sustainability. Backhaul costs (getting the data from Ukiah to the Coast) are part of SeaKay's financial equation and if there are too few subscribers to cover these costs, then a start-up network like in Westport may not survive long-term. Having a network adds community value, and allows residents who may not be able to afford the more expensive satellite to have broadband available to them. More subscribers also improve service to an entire area, as one house can act as a line-of-sight relay for another house if necessary. Satellite equipment is larger and heavier (and must be precisely aligned) and so has more visual impacts. And finally, with SeaKay you will be supporting a locally managed and operated Internet Service Provider of a San Francisco based, public-benefit corporation which will invest their profits into expanding their network here in Mendocino, versus ViaSat which is strictly commercial venture headquartered near San Diego. Already SeaKay is providing the Westport Store and the Westport Fire Department with free service and public wi-fi...you won't find the satellite companies offering such services.

**Economic reasons:** Satellite service locks you into a 2-year contract at expensive prices. At a satellite price of \$115/month for 24 months, you pay a total of \$2,760. For a similar internet experience at the SeaKay medium tier of \$65/month for 24 months, plus the installation fee of \$150, it is only \$1,710 for 2 years (but no contract required!), for a savings of over \$1,000. This would even pay for the "break contract" fee. If you went with the tier 1 at \$45/month, then your savings would be over \$1,500. Even at the most expensive SeaKay tier 4 (\$105/month) you would still pay \$100 less. The economics are in your favor, so why wait to change?
