Layla just celebrated her 20th birthday on October 19th. She went to the emergency room in Fort Bragg a few days later, not feeling well. The blood test results raised serious concerns, and Layla was sent immediately to UC Davis Medical Center for further testing. There, doctors performed a bone marrow biopsy and lumbar puncture, and friends and family awaited the results and hoped for a best case scenario. On Wednesday afternoon, Layla was diagnosed with acute myeloid leukemia.

Layla began her chemotherapy treatments the same afternoon. Her mother, Felicia, put her life on hold in order to stay with her daughter in the oncology wing as Layla faces the battle ahead. Her father, Otis, is driving back and forth between Sacramento and Fort Bragg, trying to be both emotional support for his family as well as financial provider. They are trying to stay positive.

In the face of everything before her, Layla has shown nothing but bravery and determination. Her strength is an inspiration to us all. Because of her age, Layla's



prognosis is very good. Her doctors are hopeful for a successful recovery. However, Layla is facing a long road ahead. She finished 10 days of intensive chemotherapy and additional therapy may follow. Layla hopes to be able to spend Christmas at home.

With jobs on hold and their lives interrupted, plus the cost of necessary travel expenses making the 400 mile round trip back and forth between Westport and Sacramento - this family could use a little help in the face of these sudden and unexpected financial burdens that have been placed upon them.

The family is very grateful for the outpouring of love and support that has been shown to them since the news of Layla's diagnosis. They are thankful to the community for any support through this difficult and strenuous time in their lives. A Community Request

I seek information about the incidence of diagnosed cancers in our community over the past 20 years. The County averaged 0.42 new cases per year per 1000 people between 2011 and 2015, while the national average was 0.52 cases. With the local population averaging about 300 people over many decades, this implies only 2.5 cases would be expected over a two decade period assuming the rate has been constant. I personally know of three cases in one small Westport watershed, two of them in individuals 20 years or younger. I've heard of many additional cases in the Westport community. If this doesn't alarm you, it should.

My initial research reveals that the Center for Disease Control does not identify locations more specifically than the entire County. This means the only way to find out more about our local situation is to ask for your help. Please contact me at that@mcn.org or

964-7272 if you are willing to share information that will contribute to a better understanding of the cancer pattern in our community. I agree to protect privacy unless you allow sharing. My purpose is to identify patterns and potential causes at the community level. To participate, you (or your deceased relative/friend) must have lived in the local area at the time of diagnosis. I seek information on name, gender, household address, year of diagnosis, age at diagnosis, specific type of cancer, source of potable water supply, and any known health or genetic risk factors (smoker, etc.).

Your WVFD Responders

The Westport Volunteer Fire Department responded to several 911 emergency calls during the month of November. We also had some exciting developments we'd like to share.

On November 14th, Kayla Cooper was sworn in as an active duty firefighter by Chief Dan Maxey. She has been participating in training sessions since August, and has already driven our rescue vehicle to an emergency call.

We are also making some progress in our efforts to recruit at least four more active duty members by June of 2019. John Huff has decided to join the Department as an active duty member and he has been participating in our recent training sessions. John is a paramedic on the Mendocino Coast District Hospital ambulance, and he has previous experience working as a full-time firefighter.

We've also received the two state of the art extrication tools that were purchased with the proceeds of our 2018 Annual Barbecue (see photos below). One is a "jaws of life" combination tool, and the other is a DeWalt Sawzall with carbidetipped rescue blades that can cut steel. These tools are used to rescue people who are trapped inside a vehicle. Both tools are self-contained, battery powered, and can be operated by one person. We would like to thank everyone in the community who made

our Annual Barbecue a success and enabled us to purchase these life-saving tools. Happy Holidays from all of us at Your WVFD!

Shout Out To The Fort Bragg Public Library!

This is a "Shout out!" for our North Coast County Public Library in Fort Bragg, CA. Great changes are both in the planning, and already taking place!

After the big fire in 1988, which left only a few smoking embers of our beloved library, the Friends of the Fort Bragg Library immediately opened a place where the outstanding books could be returned, and these became the kernel of the new Fort Bragg Library, now known as the Phoenix, or "up from the fire" Collection. They were determined to rebuild, and again the North Coast would have its treasure trove of great classics, mysteries, romances and humor to serve all ages of its population. They found a building, (which had been originally built for the local mortuary) and it has served well until recently.

The "little" library's clientele has now grown to more than 10,000 visits per month, and the shelves are so crammed that there is no room for expansion. Libraries must grow alongside their customers. The Friends of the Fort Bragg Library continued to support their library by supporting its programs, but they were alert to the coming crush. Then, the property next door came up for sale!! They looked wistfully out of their windows on that side of their building. *Could they buy it? If so, how?*

They studied their finances, and future finances. *They did buy it!*

Now they had twice the footprint of their original building and they began to dream of what the future library would look like. They planned for two stories, with expanded room for books, (naturally!), with more meeting rooms for the public (always in short supply), a large workroom supplied with the tools for creation of the patron's works, more workroom for the staff, etc., and the dream of many a

library; a small comfortable place to nosh and drink a beverage and have quiet conversation, etc.. After all, dreams are the possibilities of the future!

They still have yearly "Book Sales", and on line, all year. They have membership drives of \$5.00 each from a loyal group of supporters. They gave circus performances that successfully brought in \$\$\$. And Sandra Figuerido came up with the idea called "The Thousand Dollar Club". The total, she figured, for this grand plan would be \$2,000,000, and there are just 200 \$1,000 dollars in two million! This would allow the huge group of library users a chance to donate to their new library in a communal way. Whether they gave the \$1,000 for tax credit at the end of the year, or in memory of a loved one, the money would help bring fruition to the North Coast's dream library. Some groups, feeling that \$1,000 is a bit much for one subscriber, have got together and pooled their contributions to create the \$1,000, and donated it as a group. Where there is a will, there is a way!!

Yes friends, fear not those E. coli health warnings about commercial lettuce – instead, the **Westport Community Garden** has plenty of fresh, safe, organically grown Salad Bowl leaf lettuce ready for you right now, any time you need it! And I should know, since I grew it myself!

At the Westport Community Garden, <u>you</u> pick your own fresh, delicious, organically grown vegetables

anytime you want them, ABSOLUTELY FREE! And even if it's cold and stormy, there are still lots of great vegetables ready for harvest anytime right through December! This month, we'll have edible pod Sugar Snap Peas, Tomatoes (if you can find some ripe ones), Swiss Chard, Red Swiss Chard, Curly Kale, Toscano Kale, Spinach, Beet Greens (and baby Beets), Parsley, Chives, Cilantro, Oregano, and Thyme, plus an assortment of salad greens such as (safe!)Romaine Lettuce, Red Lettuce, Arugula, Mesclun (French Curly) Lettuce, and Salad Bowl Leaf Lettuce. Plus, there's a bush of fresh rosemary (who would roast a turkey without it?) right by the school building door. So just look for the greenhouse at the Westport Community Center at the end of Abalone Street, and yes, everyone in the whole world is welcome – and the Garden is open 24/7, so it just doesn't get any more convenient than that. Just pick what you want, at any time, and enjoy!
