recent archaeological investigations of a farm where several members of Elisha Frost's family lived from the 1870s until World War I or later. The Frost clan moved from Missouri to Little Lake around 1860 and sided with the Confederacy. Another prominent local family, the Coates, were staunch Republicans who supported Lincoln and abolition of slavery. While California was a free state, the electorate of the period was strongly polarized. Partisans of both pursuasions settled in the Little Lake Valley near Willits, like other parts of the County.

The Archaeology of The Little Lake Feud

Most people have heard of the famous Hatfield-McCoy Feud. But did you know there were actually more fatalities in the Little Lake Feud near Willits between 1867 and 1885? Local archaeologist and historian Thad Van Bueren will dicuss the Little Lake affair on **Saturday April 20th at 2:00PM**. This presentation at the **Westport Community Center** will be illustrated with a slide show.

Strong feelings led to disputes that in this case broke into open hositilites on the fateful day of October 16, 1867. Elisha Frost and five Coates men died in the deadly shootout that day, while three other injured men survived. The Petaluma Weekly Argus called it "a revolting affair" in an October 24, 1867 article, while other newspapers cast it as simply unfortunate. A Coroner's inquest documented the details of the affair from physical evidence and the accounts of onlookers, but no one was ever prosecuted. The families mingled during the funeral procession, with the dead buried in close proximity in the Little Lake Cemetery.

The violence spawned two more bloody shootouts and a lynching between 1867 and 1885. Seven additional fatalities occurred, while others were injured but survived those later incidents. The thread of the dispute shifted to infighting among the members of the Frost clan. Newspapers and family testimony suggest Elisha Frost's brothers persecuted their nephews for reasons that may have been rooted in the distribution of his estate. It is clear that Uncles Mart and Isom Frost systematically attacked and harassed some of Elisha's sons. One of the attacks likely took place at the investigated farm.

Only two men ever served time for the violence perpetrated during the Little Lake Feud. Isom Frost was found guilty of murdering his nephew James Frost and served time in Folsom Prison. In contrast, Elisha's sons James and David Frost were both acquitted of murder for acting in self defence during attacks perpetrated by the uncles and their confederates. The story illustrates how the dispute over slavery rippled across the years, impacting the families and community over several generations.

The Little Lake Feud offers a morality tale that still provides food for thought about divisive issues. The accompanying illustratation (see page 1) comes from the Sunday *Call* magazine of August 6, 1899, one example of how the troublesome events were revisited over time. This April 20th, 2019 slide presentation is free, but donations to the Westport Community Center are welcome. The Center occupies the former School building next to the Westport Church, at 24900 Abalone Street in Westport.

Why I Love The National Weather Service

Well folks, we did pretty good rain-wise here in Westport in March, thanks especially to some fast and furious, highly localized thunderstorms which dropped a lot of rain and hail here, especially during the last week of March. We ended up with 8.58 inches of rain for the month here on the Westport Headlands, bringing our seasonal total (since October 1st) all the way up to 39.95 inches (as usual, you folks up in the hills and canyons have received more than that). Here in town, we only need 3 more inches of rain in April and May (actually, we have until September, but it never rains much here in the summer) to get to our annual "normal", which is around 43 inches. This is very doable! Our March 2019 total rainfall was about 115% of the statistical average for the last 5 years - pretty close to our seasonal percentage now too. You can follow rainfall averages across the state every day here: https://www.cnrfc.noaa.gov/awipsProducts/RNOWR KCLI.php.

If you're like most people, you like to know what the weather is going to be like every day and also in the near future. Everybody has their own favorite way of getting weather forecasts, whether they're quick videos or more extensive written reports. Real weather nuts like me greatly prefer the latter, and there's no better way to get that than our own National Weather Service (weather.gov). Every day, I like to start with the Mendocino Forecast Discussion https://forecast.weather.gov/MapClick.php?lat=39.30 76&lon=-123.7989, and from there you've got a million things to click and places to go to that can keep you busy for hours. Just think of a place, type it in, and you'll find out what the weather is like there (and likely to be) – plus, at the bottom of the page under Climatic Outlook, you'll get all the latest longrange forecasts for the week and months ahead. But I sure like the Forecast Discussion (which is updated twice a day) best. I just swoon over their weather terms! (if you don't understand them, just click them, and they will be explained). Here's the forecast from March 26th, which turned out to be pretty accurate. Can you guess what the weather was like? ***

(NWS EUREKA, for NW California) Tuesday, March 26th, 2:53PM DISCUSSION...Light showers will remain possible over the interior mountains into the early evening hours as instability remains over that area. More widespread rains will return across the area later tonight ahead of the next system, an upper low presently located near 40N/135W. The 500 mb low will will bottom out around 531 dam Wednesday morning, then gradually fill as the storm very slowly wobbles NE. The NAM and the GFS are coming into better agreement regarding the progression of dynamic and thermodynamic forcing Wednesday morning, with a strong band of vorticity pivoting NE around the E periphery of the upper low. This feature should be coincident with modest instability (near 500 <u>J/kg</u> MUCAPES and <u>LI</u> values below 0). In additions, the models line up Q vector convergence and upper divergence in the same general area. The HRRR model depicts a fairly well organized line of convection oriented SE to NW that lifts N late tonight and Wednesday morning, grazing the Redwood Coast and spreading N by midday. As a result, have refined the thunderstorm forecast to spread isolated activity across the coastal waters early Wednesday morning, along with adjacent coastal areas near and N of <u>Cape</u> Mendocino through midday. SE to S winds will increase overnight tonight, with gusts over 40mph before daybreak at higher elevations near and N of <u>Cape</u> Mendocino. Any convective activity would also potentially mix stronger wind gusts down to the surface. The duration, areal extent, and expected maximum wind speeds look marginal at this time for any wind advisory, so will defer to later shifts to allow time to monitor model and observational trends. As the upper low become more negatively tilted, periods of positive vorticity advection and lingering instability will support a continuation of shower activity into Thursday, winding down Thursday night. Snow levels are generally expected to remain above 4000 feet through this event, with significant snow accumulations confined to the highest elevations. Modest responses to rivers are expected this week, with <u>crest</u> levels remaining below action stage.

*** Like the forecast said (or tried to say), it was cold and rainy here for the next couple of days, with a couple of bonkers thunderstorms (just a little late, in the early morning and late night on Thursday).
