### Winter Comfort Food

With the Holidays over, it's a nice change to get back to simpler (and less expensive) fare for a while! Here's an easy and quick recipe that is great for a winter "comfort food" supper – perfect on a cold rainy evening. Use this recipe "as is," or invent your own variations on the theme!

### Mac 'N Cheese Jalapeno

- 4 ounces (one cup) dry elbow macaroni
- 3 tablespoons unsalted butter
- 2 tablespoons seeded and diced jalapeno chiles
- 2 teaspoons minced garlic
- 2 tablespoons all-purpose flour
- 1 cup milk
- 2 ounces (3/4 cup) shredded sharp cheddar cheese 2 ounces (3/4 cup) shredded American cheese salt to taste

Cook macaroni, drain, and set aside. Melt butter in a saucepan, add jalapeno and garlic, and sauté around 3 minutes, until tender. Whisk in flour and cook for one minute. Whisk in milk, then stir in the American and cheddar cheese. Cook, stirring frequently, until sauce is thick and cheese is melted. Stir in cooked macaroni and season with salt. Top, if desired, with sour cream, chives, parsley, or paprika. Enjoy!

### **Reflections on the Winter Solstice**

Last month Thad Van Bueren explained the significance of the December 21<sup>st</sup> Winter Solstice on the Mayan calendar. We are now past December 21<sup>st</sup>, and the world did not end. Are things "back to normal" as they were after Y2K thirteen years ago, or are we entering a period of profound change? Several months ago I read Marcus Mason's book <u>The Astrology of 2012 and How It Affects You</u>. Mason explains how the sun and solar system gradually change their position within the Milky Way Galaxy. On December 21<sup>st</sup>, the sun began to emerge from the Dark Rift of the Milky Way's Galactic Equator and the earth's orientation changed.
