When he was one year old, my father nearly died of the Spanish Flu. Actually, he was given up for dead, and my Great Aunt Fanny, a Christian Science Practitioner, nursed him back to health at a time when conventional medical science had virtually no solutions for the virus.

The Spanish Flu of 1918 and 1919 (which did not start in Spain) was one of the deadliest plagues to hit humanity in history, with one out of every three humans catching the disease and 10% of those affected dying. It struck at a time when medical science was still helpless to fight such a disease, and it spread very quickly due to the then-unprecedented movement of humans around the world due to WWI.

For over 100 years now, people have been asking if there could ever be another global plague like the Spanish Flu. Surely, modern medicine had advanced enough that such a thing could never happen again? And we have vaccines now, so wouldn't we be protected? But medical science has always said that it could happen again. And now it has. And just like 100 years ago, mass movement of people around the planet has helped the COVID-19 virus spread rapidly. And just like 100 years ago, quarantine is a first line of defense, not medicine.

This new virus is remarkable in that it can hide in people without their knowing it, making them traveling Typhoid Marys for a few to several days before they show any symptoms. It is the perfect virus strategy to create the perfect storm of infection.

When crisis hits, whatever crisis that may be, people need help. And that help starts close to home, in our community. Westportians have always helped one



another, through thick and thin, and now is no different. Together, we can help one another.

Paradoxically, these stay-at-home quarantine times are bringing us all closer together – not via in-person social gatherings but rather by medically safe telephone and internet communication. And that's just what we need right now, because let's face it ladies and gentlemen, a lot of us are *just plain scared*. To be sure, to minimize the spread of COVID, we must first and foremost do what the medical doctors tell us to do by limiting our travel and staying at home. Welcome to the Covidian Era

Ready or not, we have entered another defining period in history. The Covidian Era. The primary characteristics include the spread of a global pandemic, widespread economic stress, a glut of media coverage, and many associated worries. It is a phenomenon we are all pondering.

Obsessive attention to the COVID-19 pandemic highlights some of the problems of our technological age: namely, the explosive spread of misinformation. Now, as always, it is important to consider sources, reliability, and to use critical thinking.

Misinformation can be used to distract, harm and

of March 26, however. That higher death rate is a result of shortcomings in prevention (not enough folks taking precautions or having access to personal protective equipment), diagnosis (not enough testing), and treatment (shortages of ventilators, for example). Simulations of the spread without any precautions suggest up to 4 million deaths could occur in the US. With drastic prevention that could be reduced to thousands. So you really can help make a difference.

The infection rate is still rising steeply everywhere outside of China. In other words, we are not seeing the top of the curve yet. You can examine the trends yourself at <u>https://ncov2019.live/</u>, <u>https://www.worldometers.info/coronavirus/</u>, and

other places. For historical perspective, it's worth mentioning the 1918 Spanish flu pandemic killed

manipulate us. Modern technology is making that worse as the pace of communication escalates.

A few things are clear from analysis of facts. Preventive measures can make a BIG difference in curtailing the spread of COVID-19. China's epidemic is now in steep decline because they practiced drastic social distancing, banned travel, and implemented draconian hygienic measures, as shown in this graph by the World Health Organization. The success of that approach is the reason radical precautions are



now being taken in many other places. China kept the mortality to just 4% of about 81,000 cases.

The global mortality rate in all resolved cases (people who either recovered or died) stands closer to 16% as

Source: WHO coronavirus disease [COVID-2019] situation reports about 50 million people and spread through a third of the world's population, then about 1.5 billion souls. That was before disease spread and prevention were well understood.





There are some positive things to consider amid all the worries. Shelter in place orders have reduced travel and consequently air pollution is way down. The reduction in air travel is particularly valuable because planes inject pollution into the upper atmosphere, where it contributes disproportionately to global warming. This is a good time to evaluate how much of our travel is a luxury. Is it possible to reduce our carbon footprint? Perhaps walk or bike more?

This current economic pain also holds the opportunity to reduce consumption. Perhaps we can learn to live more simply, unplug more often, and even grow our own vegetables. Contrary to the capitalist myth of perpetual growth, the world and its resources are finite. There is no Planet B. As a scientist who has studied both issues, climate change is accelerating and we are entering the sixth global mass extinction event. So what we do really does matter. Renovations at the Westport Church and Community Hall Thad Van Bueren

Thanks to the work of many volunteers and generous financial contributions from the community, several renovations have been completed at the Church and Community Hall over the past month. You may have seen some of that work in progress. We ask that you exercise caution in areas marked with warning tape as the work is still in progress. Please be aware gatherings at the facilities are temporarily suspended outages when the propane heater will not work. The Community Hall is still heated with a heat pump powered by electricity. Please, please, be certain to shut off the heat when the buildings are not in use!

The major construction improvement was the replacement of a termite-infested wood walkway

between the two buildings. The walkway was replaced by two concrete ramps that now connect each building to the basketball court. The old concrete slab with handprints and signatures dating back to when the old Westport School was built was saved and installed nearby. A railing and some bank stabilization are still in progress, so please exercise caution and stay out of areas flagged with yellow caution tape. Completion of this project is expected by early April.
