Most of you are aware that the nonprofit Westport Community Church is transitioning to give local members more say in how we serve the community. The organization changed its bylaws, began accepting members, and the first Board election was held in December. Tabitha Korhummel was elected to a three year term by a vote of those members. In the next two years the other four Board positions will also come up for election. You can become a member (and run for a Board position) if you are over 18, your primary residence is in the Westport area, and you pay annual membership dues (individuals \$20, families \$30). You think about the story, the acting, the song, the action. Do you ever notice the screen where many movies have been projected?

The nature of the mind is to attach itself to that which is transitory. On the surface are things that are always changing - our identities, our relationships, the events in our life. But there is also an aspect that is ever present, ever pure, whole, perfect that is always in the background.

Paying attention to that aspect of our life that is beyond our superficial self, is living a spiritual life. If we are only identifying with what is happening on the surface - our emotional life, our physical life, our material life - suffering is bound to happen.

The more we identify with our own inner fullness, the more strength we gain to deal with whatever comes our way. Instead of being swayed with what is happening on the surface, a spiritual aspirant remains grounded in what is always there, ever whole.

One year ago the dream of conserving DeHaven Beach and Headlands was launched through a collaboration among the Westport Village Society, the land owner Donna Medley, and the State Coastal Conservancy. WVS was overwhelmed by strong local support and the generosity of the community. The funds donated by the community helped pay for several studies and closing costs that supported our efforts to obtain a grant. In September the SCC approved a grant for the acquisition and planning phases of the project. We are happy to announce that escrow closed December 15, 2022. Thanks so much for your support!!

WVS will seek public input as the planning process for the DeHaven property rolls out in 2023. Botanical and wetland surveys will occur in the spring and engineering input will be sought for prospective trail and parking improvements. Public meetings will be announced in future articles. The goal is to prepare a responsible management plan that balances wise

#### 2022 in Review

**Westport Volunteer Fire Department** 

**2022** was a very productive year for the Westport Volunteer Fire Department. In March our new ISO rating of 04/4X went into effect. This rating puts us in the top 32% of all fire departments evaluated by ISO in the United States, including paid as well as volunteer departments, and is one of the best ISO ratings of fire departments on the Mendocino Coast. It should help members of our community obtain fire insurance.

On June 30 Chief Dan Maxey led the response to a water rescue involving 11 people, including 7 children, who were trapped in a small cove below the parking area north of Howard Creek when the tide was coming in. All 11 people were safely rescued and brought to high ground by a CalFire helicopter. This was the largest number of lives saved by a fire department in a single water rescue incident in Mendocino County.

Much of our work during the year was devoted to training and upgrading equipment. In addition to our regular training schedule, six consecutive Saturdays were devoted to various aspects of Firefighter 1 and Firefighter 2 training by CalFire Battalion Chief Nate Deurloo. Several members of our Department

completed all six sessions, making them eligible to participate in wildfire strike teams and to provide coverage at CalFire stations.

We were awarded several grants that made it possible to significantly upgrade our equipment. We purchased a surplus Basic Life Support (BLS) ambulance from Laytonville Fire, which is now our initial response vehicle for medical calls. This acquisition also enabled us to dedicate our rescue unit to calls that involve rescuing people from the bottom of a cliff and extricating people who are trapped inside vehicles. The other vehicle we acquired is a trailer with a system of compressed air tanks so our firefighters can refill their SCBA bottles at the scene of a fire. Towards the end of the year we were awarded a USDA grant

that enabled us to purchase a new side-by-side ATV vehicle that will enhance our emergency response to medical and injury calls on beaches and other offroad areas.

We also purchased new turnouts for structure fires from the proceeds of a grant, and received a generous donation of upgraded mobile radios from Mendocino Fire. Grants from the Community Foundation of Mendocino County, the Mendocino County Fire Safe Council and a Mendocino County allocation of PG&E settlement funds enabled us to purchase six 5,000 gallon water tanks. Two of those tanks will be installed on Branscomb Road, and four will be installed off Highway 1 in Rockport. These tanks will enable us to store a total of 30,000 gallons of water for firefighting in remote parts of our response area. Westport also became its own Fire Safe Council, giving our community access to various fire prevention and fire containment resources.

In May and October we had two successful fundraising events and greatly appreciate the support of our community. We still need more active duty firefighters, and encourage anyone potentially interested in joining our team to contact a WVFD member.

We wish everyone in the Westport Community a healthy, happy, and safe New Year!
