Food trucks will have food for sale. Local craft beer and wine can be purchased. Coffee, sweets and non-alcoholic beverages will also be available for purchase. Craft merchants will have their wares for sale, and there will also be a silent auction of some very special items.

There will be plenty of fun activities for the whole family, including a chance to watch a Cornhole Competition sponsored by Epic Graphics. A helicopter from Reach/CalStar may pay us a visit if weather and availability cooperate.

This will be a great way to spend an afternoon and support the Westport Volunteer Fire Dept., which



provides initial 911 emergency response service 24/7, year-round, throughout an expanded area now covering roughly 120 square miles.

Our fundraising goal for this event is to raise enough money to purchase a medical rescue skid mount unit and a firefighting skid mount unit for our new allterrain emergency response vehicle, and a rescue wheel for our stokes basket litter. The medical rescue unit will enable our personnel to treat and transport a patient from the remote scene of an incident to an ambulance. The firefighting unit will make it possible for our all-terrain vehicle to extinguish a small fire before it spreads. The rescue wheel will make it possible for two people, rather than four, to move a patient from a remote scene to a location where the patient can receive emergency medical treatment.

Roadside Fuel Reduction Plans for Westport in August

Hello Folks! Team Rubicon has been called to the Eastern US to help communities heavily impacted by

flooding and tornadoes. Thus, their work in Westport will be delayed.

The good news is we will be using our Mendocino County Fire Safe Micro Grant funds to start the roadside fuel reduction work during the same week as when Team Rubicon would have been here (the first full week of August). The MCFSC funds will bring in a local crew, Elk Ridge Tree Service, for the same important work, while expanding local employment opportunities and job training for our local labor force. You may have seen these crews working along Highway 1 between Rockport and Leggett last year.

Additionally, through the Mendocino County Fire Safe Council we will be working with the DSAFIE program to provide no-cost fuel reduction around homes. This program will remove brush or tall grass, trim trees, clean gutters, and rake from around your home to provide a larger defensible space. The work is done by insured contractors. You can also have a Fire Safe Home Assessment that can help you make the structure of your home safer.

DeHaven Coastal Access

A lot of work has been going on behind the scenes to move the DeHaven conservation and public coastal access project forward. A botanical survey and wetland delineation is due by the end of July, allowing the Westport Village Society (WVS) to put the final touches on a draft Management Plan for the 26-acre coastal property at the mouth of DeHaven Creek. That MP will include a proposal for access improvements and other actions designed to facilitate coastal access, opportunities for recreation, and tribal uses that are compatible with wise conservation of natural resources, sensitive habitats, cultural and historical resources, and the scenic qualities of the parcel acquired last year by WVS with a grant from the State Coastal Conservancy (SCC).

A Draft MP will be posted on the WVS website by mid-August. Look for that posting at https://www.westportvillagesociety.org/projects.html. Comments, suggestions, and letters of support received before September 15, 2023 will be taken into consideration as WVS works to refine and finalize that plan. Notice of the availability of the draft DeHaven MP will be sent to people who get this

Proposed improvements include a stairway, trail system, and parking lot on the southern headland, while the popular informal public foot trail from the northeast property corner to the beach will be maintained. Preliminary engineering plans have been prepared for the stairway and parking lot. The new concrete stairway with wood rails will be anchored to the exposed bedrock bluff south of the creek, providing access between the beach and southern headland. New foot trails set back from the edge of the south headland will be mowed but otherwise unimproved along routes that avoid resource impacts. A paved parking lot is proposed off State Route 1 south of its intersection with Branscomb Road to provide access to that new trail network and a sign will be placed at that trailhead.

The goal of the proposed improvements is to extend the California Coastal Trail about a half mile south from Westport Union Landing State Beach to the south end of the DeHaven property. Once the MP is finalized work will move forward on finalizing the engineering and applying for required permits. The permits are expected to include a Coastal Development Permit and a Caltrans Encroachment Permit. Please contact me at wvs@westportvillagesociety.org with questions and comments.

Coming up this month we'll begin to see tomatoes, tomatillos, melons, and golden berries so keep checking-in on their progress!

The Community Garden work day for August will take place on Saturday, August 19th @10:30am. Feel free to stop in anytime you feel like getting your hands in the dirt though - there are always weeds that need to be pulled, vines that need to be trellised and veggies harvested! Happy Summer!
