The Westport Slide

On March 7th, the Westport Municipal Advisory Council hosted a meeting at the Community Center that focused on the slide on State Route 1 south of the village. The Caltrans presentation included a slide show that covered past maintenance, the current emergency project, and planning for a longer-term solution. It was followed by a discussion of community questions and concerns. The geological scope of the slide was first characterized by Senior Engineering Geologist Charlie Narwold based on photogrammetric mapping and borings. The massive slide is 1400 feet wide and over 100 feet thick in some places. Slippage is most pronounced in winter months when the slide is lubricated by underground water flows.

Project Manager Trevor Goff and Area Construction Engineer Geoffrey Wright then discussed recent maintenance and the new emergency project that is now underway. Two soldier pile ground anchor (SPGA) walls were completed in 2021 in the south and central portions of the slide to stabilize the road prism and protect it from shallow landslides below the roadway. The walls and roadway essentially "float" on the slide rather than holding the hillside stationary. Above average precipitation the past two years and ongoing removal of material by wave action at the base of the slide both contributed to the roadway settling.

The emergency project has cut the roadway grade down at the north end of the slide seven vertical feet, paved one lane, and installed signals to control oneway traffic. The one-way signalized traffic will be in place until the emergency repair is completed in 2025. Borings are now in progress to inform the design of a new 500 feet wide SPGA wall that will be installed to stabilize the roadway at the north end of the slide (see figure). The emergency project will also include evaluation of the feasibility of a dewatering system and revetment wall at the base of the slide along the beach. The revetment wall would be similar to the one at Juan Creek that is made of rip rap boulders. The emergency project is being designed on an expedited basis and coordinated with regulatory agencies and tribes to protect environmental and cultural resources.

Lianna Winkler-Prins, the Project Manager for the longer-term Caltrans Restoration Project, then covered future planning efforts with the goal of issuing a Draft Environmental Document by 2028. That restoration project will analyze alternatives for a longer-term solution. The alternatives under consideration include a subsurface drainage system; a tunnel; or an inland bypass. The inland bypass has been ruled out as too expensive, difficult to construct, and impactful on the environment. The tunnel is also costly, but has not yet been ruled out. This restoration project would be constructed sometime after 2032.

Comments from the community raised questions about speeding dump trucks, the impacts of hauling materials on County roads (Branscomb and the streets in the village), the long wait time during controlled one-way traffic including its impact on the passage of emergency vehicles, and degradation of Route 1 south of Chadbourne Gulch and north of the village near Wages Creek. The traffic delays are now minimized as the one-way traffic is signalized. Caltrans will do their best to address community concerns and they plan to develop a website for this project to keep the public informed about scheduling of the work and to provide a channel for further input. That link will be provided in this newsletter once it is known.

Westport Village Society March Westport Town Hall Update

Do you want Westport to be a Community, or just a place where people live?

This question was posed at the Westport Town Hall Meeting held two weeks ago. The stated purpose of the meeting was to stimulate input from the residents of Westport about preservation and utilization of the property and structures owned by the Westport Community Church (WCC), the only structures in Westport not held privately.

The Town Hall Meeting was lightly attended, but there was meaningful discussion on the topics. A quick summary of some of the more interesting ones are:

- There are currently few public events allowing people to meet and mingle.
- Local organizations seem to be struggling and don't feel open and friendly.
 - Primarily the WCC and Westport Village Society (WVS).
- Topics directly related to the WCC
 - Preservation and stewardship of buildings
 - Significant deferred maintenance and needed structural repairs.
 - How to identify/prioritize what needs to be done and actually get it done.
 - Concern that lack of action will result in permanent loss: Do while we still can!
 - Utilization
 - Who wants to use WCC buildings for events, meetings, activities?
 - How do interested Westport residents engage?
 - How can WCC and WVS do better outreach?
 - Management
 - WCC Board lacks funds and people to operate the organization.

- Topics for WVS consideration
 - o How can WVS help?
 - WVS does have operational and financial resources.
 - WVS bylaws and policies allow members to suggest/request projects/actions that are beneficial to the WVS served area.
 - Any help from WVS needs to be seen as beneficial by WCC's Board and Members as well as WVS's Members and Board.
