Please Stop Dumping Green Waste Along Omega Drive

In mid-March a large landslide took out much of the hillside at the north end of Omega Drive where residents have been dumping their green waste for years. The accumulated material along with whatever was left of the bluff slid down to the beach so that it is now just a vertical drop. The area is dangerous and the integrity of Omega Drive is at risk since the bluff face is now just a couple of feet from the roadway (see photo above). Please refrain from dumping any additional green waste at that site to protect the road and the beach.

The issue was discussed at the recent WVS meeting and the County has been notified. The County will be posting signage prohibiting dumping at that site and warning of the potential dangers. Assessment is underway to stabilize Omega Drive. The WMAC will discuss this issue **May 2nd at 7:00 PM** at the Community Center (visit:

https://www.wmac95488.org/). Alternatives for local green waste disposal will be explored at the WMAC meeting. One possibility is a composting program near the Fire Department/Transfer Station supported by the County solid waste program. Join us and share your ideas!

The 2nd Town Hall meeting was held on Thursday, April 25^h after the quarterly WVS Business meeting. There were over 20 people in attendance at the Westport Community Center. This article will summarize discussion and major points, but the topics covered need interactive discussion to be fully appreciated.

Starting with the question from last month's Town Hall, "Do you want Westport to be a Community, or just a place where people live?", there was a lot of energy discussing how can we strengthen our Community.

Various points discussed:

- How and who maintains buildings and grounds on WCC property

- Work together before having a formal relationship
- Community events provide personal enjoyment both in participation and preparations

- Events need to be better advertised; phone trees, person to person conversation...
- Regular schedules for activities and events
- Possible activities; Dances, Pot Lucks, Breakfasts, Speakers, Art Classes, Fitness & Health

Last but not least, on April 28th the first Sunday Village Walking Group met in front of the Community Store at 10 AM. We walked through Westport, stopping by the Omega St. Slide (see article), and ended up at the picnic tables behind the WCC for pumpkin bread and coffee. There were about 10 people, young, older, new comers, old timers enjoying a beautiful Westport morning and getting to know each other better.
