Westport Union Landing State Park

The Westport Village Society continues to explore options for taking over the operation of this park to prevent closure at the end of June. Negotiations with State Parks are progressing well and the main roadblock is the need for funding to address startup costs and the predicted annual operating shortfall. Collectively, they amount to about \$50,000. That is clearly a large chunk of change. However, the consequences of park closure for our community make it imperative to raise the money.

It is possible to reach that goal, and WVS needs to do so by the middle of May. The best approach is through a combination of donations, fundraising, and grants. Direct donations and fundraising will help us attract grant money, so we'd like to first urge you to **send donations to WVS at P.O. Box 446, Westport CA 95488 and mark your checks "for W-UL."** WVS is actively working with local tribes who use the park, and they have indicated a willingness to help us with fundraising and possible grant assistance. Lastly, WVS will apply for a grant from the State Park Foundation, and SPF will announce grant awards by May 15.

A meeting was held at the park March 23 with representatives from the offices of Assemblyman Wes Chesbro and State Senator Noreen Evans. The Westport Village Society organized the event which was attended by John De Luca of State Parks, five tribal representatives (Cahto, Round Valley, and Sherwood), Advocate News reporter Theresa Schumaker, and several members of the local community. Three pieces of legislation are making their way through the Assembly and State Senate, but the approval process is lengthy and will not be resolved in time to prevent the planned closure of our local park. Still, we encourage you to support AB 1579, SB 974, and SB 1078 which you can learn about on the websites for Assemblyman Wes Chesbro and Senator Noreen Evans.

WMAC Meeting

The Westport Municipal Advisory Council will meet April 3 at 7:00 PM at the Church. Caltrans Traffic Engineer Darron Hill will present the latest speed zone study for the town of Westport, which recommends a limit of 35 MPH in both directions. This means a 30 MPH limit in the southbound direction will be upgraded to 35 MPH. Supervisor Kendall Smith also plans to attend. My contribution this month will be brief, as I remain hard at work writing a new Westport history book. Before I say anything else, I want to offer a correction to my article from last month. Darwin Thompson mentioned that the local airplane shown on the right in the last issue was owned jointly by Bob and Calvin Shannon. Bob had a pilot's license, while Calvin was just learning. Their plane is the one in front of the hangar shown in the image taken on the Thompson's Dehaven farm. One day they went up when a storm was coming in with high winds and 20 foot waves. Calvin was at the controls. He tried to land and clipped a telephone pole, with the result the plane went over the edge of the cliff out toward Abalone Point. They made it out onto the wing and entered the water to swim ashore, but only Bob made it to safety. Attempts to rescue Calvin were unsuccessful, and his body was later recovered much to the regret of the community.

Like many of you, I was saddened by the recent passing of Raymond (Dobbie) Bowen, mentioned in the last newsletter. I've known Dobbie since I arrived here in the early 1990s. He was active in community causes and that was how I first met him. We often talked after that and he openly shared memories of his experiences as a local Native American. His family roots go deeper than most because they included grandparents of the Usal, Sherwood Pomo, and Wintun tribes. I'm never bored out here at the Recycle Center. I can watch whales to the west, migrating and resident birds here at the water district ponds, and who knows what might surprise me looking east to the hills and forest. This is all plenty to keep me happy – but then there are also all of you, my customers, sharing their own nature stories as we work together to keep our planet a little "greener". Your stories and deep appreciation of our natural environment are fantastic!

When visiting the Recycle Center, everyone enjoys seeing our herd of hard-working water district goats, who keep the fields tidy and manicured. But it's not always easy being a goat. While we humans are tucked into our warm homes, riding out a rugged winter storm, these guys are hunkered down in the cold wind and rain, praying for a sunny day. Fear not, my furry friends, for it looks like help is on the way! Thanks to donations from Harvey Hochstetter, Lee Tepper and Dorine Real, and Heather and Brian Hawes, we are putting together plans for a goat shelter on the water district field to protect them from the elements. Cliff Fisher has volunteered to draw up a construction plan with an estimated cost. Any of you who would like to donate money, time, or materials to this project can contact me here at the Recycle Center. Any donation, no matter how small, is welcome!

Now, time for Bird Notes, starting with our first swallow, who arrived here on February 24th for a brief visit. Predictably, the big swallow crowd should be arriving within the next couple of weeks. My mated pair of ravens is back, gathering grass for their nest, waiting patiently for the kibble they know I have stashed in my office, and displaying their raven affection for each other in surprisingly gentle ways. These ravens are all-year residents here, and have brought their children here to meet me for two years in a row. Yes, they all have names – but the problem is that at my age, I forget them on a weekly basis. It's still a little difficult for me to speak raven, anyway.

On Saturday, March 3rd, we had a very special visitor here. When I arrived at work, a brilliant flash over the pond caught my eye. A bird, but a very BIG bird. There was no mistaking that this was a Bald Eagle! With the help of my binoculars, I had an up-closeand-personal experience with this majestic creature that lasted for four hours! And it was soon obvious as to why this eagle chose Westport on that day. Ever since we've had a large flock of American coots (known as mudhens to many) at the ponds here, this Westport buffet has been heavily attended, with many species of hawks doing the catching, and vultures and ravens gleaning the leftovers. Our bald eagle was hungry, but although mature, was a little slow in getting his food. After 3 hours and 18 sweeps over the water, one unlucky coot became lunch. The Demos' eucalyptus grove provided a scenic picnic spot for that lunch – and then, the eagle was up, up, and away for parts unknown. Thank you for the visit, my friend!

A quick note here about recycling...we do take all unwanted small electronic devices, including computers, monitors, televisions (but no large screens, please), and dead batteries of any sort (including car batteries) – and there is no charge for this service. Just think of how good your garage will look when you get rid of this old stuff, and how good you'll feel that you remembered to recycle them!

Well, that's it for this month's column. There's always something new to discover about the natural world around us, and I love to hear your nature stories when you visit. The Westport Recycling Center is located on Highway 1, just north of town (phone 962-9250). We are open from 10AM to 2PM Thursdays and Fridays, and from 10AM to 2PM on Saturdays. GALLERY THIS! @ THE WESTPORT HOTEL now has the new WATER SHOW up in the dining room. This array of art is just like old times, because some of our own Westport artists have submitted their work. Come see Toby Hickman's copper underwater scene (www.calsmith.org), Kathryn LeMieux's ocean painting, underwater photos of mine, paintings by Jacquelyn & John Hewitt, Lee Tepper's huge 6ft waterfall photo, and a surprise piece from Logan Smith (www.jlogansmith.com). This show will evolve into Heritage Days for May and stay up for 2 months. I'm still looking for ships off the coast of Westport or in the Mighty Blue somewhere. Wish I could paint a big ship pulling up to a pier in Westport.

Did you know that there is another college in our area



that teaches art? It is called Pacific Union College Art Retreat, in Albion. There are little cabins and a common kitchen and studios to paint in. Most of the students fly in from other places but it is available to us locals. There is a July 8-20 class coming up. John Hewitt has been teaching there for 15 years. Heritage Days in May is a global event. Having Westport be part of something global sounded fun, so I went to talk with Sue at the Kelly House Museum. The research from the Internet and sitting at the Kelly House, going through books and documents, brought great joy, because I was able to come home with a large amount of facts about some sunken ships off of Westport. There were stories about 4 shipwrecks off our coast. These are the names of the ships that went down off the shores of Westport: C. H. Merithew (June 24,1887), Emily Franssen (Sept.1884), H. H. Briggs (Oct.6, 1887), and H. H. Knapp. And here's a story about a ship called the FROLIC, which wrecked just north of Pt. Cabrillo in the summer of 1850:

On Sunday, December 8, 1844 the Frolic cast off from Corner's wharf in Baltimore. She was a new vessel, with a deck cluttered with two yawls, a longboat, and a barnyard of caged animals. She was piloted safely out of the Patapsco River and down Chesapeake Bay. Several years later she would be moored off Cumsingmoon, China to deliver a cargo of opium to the Heards' receiving vessel Lady Hayes. The ship Don Juan, under Captain Harding, was one of the main drug smuggling ships that was able to travel to far-flung coastal locations where smaller lots of drugs could be sold for hard currency. A letter from Harding, "There are few purchasers from Chappu, so we are headed for the Northern Coast of the Americas." (from The Voyage of the Frolic by Thomas Layton 1997)

There is a story about the Don Juan meeting up with the H.H. Knapp, which crashed off of Westport. Come to story telling night at the Westport Hotel on April 15th for more of this story!

Paintings of a ship off of Westport are wanted! There is an awesome photo of the Tall Ship Lynx off Point Cabrillo. Go to www.pointcabrillolighthouse.org for slideshows and a wonderful detailed history of their great finds. On a calm, flat day anyone with an underwater disposable camera, a weight belt, and a buddy, may still attempt to go out and capture small remnants of the Frolic. There is a dream team in Fort Bragg working on a way to build a reef off the shore of the mill site, by sinking a boat/ship or barge. Jenny Robly, Pt. Cabrillo's docent/writer, helped build a reef off the coast of Florida, by sinking a plane. Some environmentalist just freak at the thought! Planes, barges or vessels can be cleaned up for these purposes and help the oceans grow more reefs for more sea creatures to live! Underwater photography!

I was bestowed a barge from my uncle, Frank Donavan, who had an urchin /salvage business in San Pedro. He salvaged a barge that sank in the harbor and then became the owner. Frank had a salvage boat called the Roughneck which he and my brothers set pilings in Marina Del Rey, using hard hats, a tender and whatever else it takes for these jobs. This equipment, the roughneck & the barge have been donated to the diving team waiting to salvage what's left of the H.H. Knapp.

Before I moved to Westport I was an avid scuba diver with a passion for sunken ships, Spanish Galleons in particular. The Frolic was in the back of my mind for years, and I'd fantasize about finding treasures or artifacts. Last month, my dream/bubble was popped. There was an expedition in 2006 that dove for months off of Point Cabrillo. Dreams do come true – find yours! One more link for you lovers of the ocean, surfing, or giant waves: google youtube; Chris Bryan "Biggest Teahupoo Ever". This is truly incredible! Any questions regarding my stories?
