Westport Village Society News

The Westport Village Society meeting on the evening of April 19 filled the church. Most of the discussion focused on the pending closure of Westport Union Landing State Beach. Richard Smith, the Chair of the Cahto Tribe in Laytonville and Sonny Elliott, the Tribe Environmental Director came to share perspectives and discuss how the park might be kept open through a cooperative venture. Many local residents spoke about the importance of keeping the park open, but some expressed concern about the financial and other risks for the WVS.

In the end, the Westport Village Society will pursue a cooperative model for keeping the park open with the Cahto Tribe. Further discussions will be needed, but an initial idea is for WVS to take the primary responsibility in the first year with Cahto support and then step back to support Cahto as the lead in the second year. We urge you to make a donation to the cause because that will help us attract grant funding. Please send donations to WVS at P.O. Box 446, Westport CA 95488 and mark your checks "for W-UL." There is also a donation can on the counter in the Community Store.

The WVS will apply for an operating grant from the California State Park Foundation to help fill a large shortfall in our proposed operating budget. We planned to apply for a first round grant on April 23 with the volunteer assistance of grant writer Lesli Langsley, but a power outage that day foiled our effort. The good news is there is a second round in May and our application is already largely complete. So we will apply then.

In other news, the WVS will soon have its own web site. A draft design for the site was briefly discussed at our meeting, and the domain and hosting services are already being set up. We have a lot of ideas for the web site including posting current and past newsletters, current information, and local history collected as a result of our ongoing history project.

Broadband For Westport - Almost!

If you are willing to use a satellite dish and have a clear view of the southern sky there is a new choice for real broadband internet access. The company's name is Exede. It is owned by, Via Sat, the parent company that owns Wild Blue. The Exede service is provided from a new satellite and utilizes a new generation of Modem, the box between the dish antenna and your computer or home network router. In our area it comes in two flavors, regular or Recovery Act supported. The regular service has higher bandwidth, up to 12 Mega Bits per second (mbps) and lower limit data plans (how much data you receive/send each month). Data plans are measured in Giga Bytes per month (GB/mo). You also pay for the equipment and the installation. The table below summarizes the two plans.

Keep in mind, however, that high-speed Internet access in rural unserved areas is covered by the U.S. Recovery Act, providing free equipment and installation and a monthly rate reduction of about \$10. Call 1-877-335-0127 to see if you are eligible, but my understanding is that the entire 95488 zip code is eligible. If you are already a Wild Blue customer, you

must contact Wild Blue cutomer service directly to change your service. The U. S. Recovery Act funds have all been allocated by the government. Apparently Exede has funds remaining, but this is a limited time offer.

Dish Network, the satellite TV people, announced a similar service last January, but have not provided a date when service will start. Other companies will probably offer a competitive service over the next year. Current satellite providers in our area Hughes Net, Wild Blue, and Starband (may have been taken over by Hughes Net), offer "up to" 1mbps, less than one tenth the new service. Satellite internet is asymmetrical, meaning that data you send goes at a much slower rate than data you receive. In Exceed's case the up-link, or rate you send data, is 3 mbps, significantly faster than current providers up-link rate of around 100 kilobits per second and even faster than current down-link data rates.

Exceed's pricing doesn't follow an obvious pattern, the table shows what they offer. They also offer special deals, usually for the next short period of time. Check their web site, http://get.exede.com/ You can also call 1-877-579-7875 to see what the latest "deal" is. Ususally deals are for the basic regular data plan and provide free equipment and installation. You cannot change between a Recovery plan and a regular one, but you can change your data plan, up or down, on a monthly basis. For information without deal hype, go to http://exede.com. I have just gotten the Recovery Act, 3 mbps, 27 GB/mo service. If anyone wants to contact me about how it is working, send an email to bill@netwidget.com.
