## The Time Traveler

Looking through the WVS historical archive, I ran across a copy of the June 2, 1883 issue of the *North Coast Review*, published 130 years ago for distribution in Kibesillah and Westport. You could subscribe to this weekly rag for just \$2 per year. But it was only published for a couple of years by William Heeser, the owner of the *Mendocino Beacon*, before this local edition was discontinued. The local manager was Frank A. Whipple of Kibesillah.

Like many newspapers of the time, this one is filled with news and commentaries that include sparse local content. Advertisements for Westport businesses were limited to those of Dr. T. H. Smith (physician and surgeon) and Alfred Nelson Jr. (Justice of the Peace), and W. H. Beardsley's Westport Hotel, while other ads included one for J. W. Barrett's hotel, bar and restaurant in Kibesillah and the competing stage lines of Len Barnard and John Bryan. An editorial by Heeser exhorts locals about the need for safe ship landings, while local news is relegated to page 3.

The phrasing of the following entries give a real "flavor" of those times: "Bethune Perry of Whitesboro was married to Beulah Van Shaick of Westport at Beardsley's Hotel in Westport on June 1 by the Reverend J. S. Ross. Mr. J. T. Tuttle of Westport arrived on a steamer this week on his return from San Francisco. Being an ex-soldier of the U. S. Army, he stopped over to keep Memorial Day here with his comrades. J. W. Barrett always gives a ball on the eve of the fourth of July, and anyone who has attended one of his balls knows that a most enjoyable dance will be held at Barrett's Hall the 4th of July next."

Here's more – "Chas. Glasier who works in the woods and Gordon and Gill's mill on Wages Creek was severely bruised about the head by the falling of a limb last Wednesday. Haying in May is something unusual on the coast, but Mr. Ed Tullis cut about 20 tons last week and is now preparing it for the hay press. An attempt will be made to tow the schooner *Gussie Klose*, which capsized at Rockport last week, to San Francisco for repairs, a tug boat having been ordered for that purpose."

So that's the Westport news – 130 years ago!



## Satellite Internet for Poor Folks

In last month's *Wave*, Thad Van Bueren wrote a very timely column about a new low-priced satellite internet service for the Westport area. It's from Wildblue, courtesy of the Recovery Act, it's just for folks who don't have satellite service yet, and it's only \$39.95/month, with no installation fees and nothing to buy. That got my attention, as it did with a number of other folks in these parts as well!

After years of at least semi-high-speed (DSL) internet service in both North San Diego County and Washington's Olympic Peninsula, I moved to Westport 4 years ago but could not afford our (what I considered expensive) satellite internet service. And so it was back to dial-up for me – but hey, it was free, and that was the way a lot of us did it in the 1990's! Want to look at a website? Just dial it up, and go mow the lawn! Your website will be there when you get back! Could this new plan get me back to the "good old days" of high-speed internet?

I quickly contacted Matthew Tyson ((707) 272-3278, or email him at [mattietyson@hotmail.com](mailto:mattietyson@hotmail.com)), who's the designated Wildblue sales and installation representative for our area. Within just a couple of days, Matthew was here, and installed a fancy satellite dish and a bunch of wiring, and everything immediately worked perfectly. *And I didn't have to pay one penny extra!* What I do pay is just \$39.95 per month, which is billed directly to my debit/credit card. (If I cancel during my first 12 months, there is a reasonable penalty that equals just a small percentage of the remaining months' balance due.) Just two Andrew Jacksons per month? Hey, that's something even I can deal with!

OK, it's not really "high speed internet". In fact, it's only around 10% of the speed that the U.S. Government considers "high speed". That's satellite for you, but we don't have any faster (hard-wired) options here in "the sticks". My internet speed now is still 40 times faster than dial-up, so what used to take me a minute now takes me only a second. What can you do on the internet for \$39.95/month? Plenty! E-mail, photo-sharing, website viewing, and You Tube videos all are instantaneous, and you get 10GB of monthly bandwidth to play with, so you can watch "Double Rainbow" 20 times every day and still not

pay any more. (If you want more bandwidth, you can pay more and get it.)

What you can't do at this internet speed is much the same that many of us couldn't do with DSL 10 years ago – which means that you are too slow to comfortably stream movies or anything HD. And downloading that kind of stuff would get you to your 10GB monthly bandwidth allowance in a hurry, anyway – so then you'll have to pay more for extra bandwidth. But here's the bottom line, folks – I'm really happy with my new "high speed" internet service from Wildblue (my only problem now is that everything internet is so fast, I haven't had time to mow my lawn in quite a while!) And the biggest plus here at Happy Acres is that our phone line isn't tied up when I'm on the internet. That alone has really scored me a bunch of points around here!

### Synchronicity II

I wanted to follow up on the story I wrote for the February 2013 *Westport Wave* about Synchronicity. I was writing in a hurry to make the newsletter "finish line", and forced by constraints of time to leave loose ends around the horse story I was looking for. In the original column, I used selected contents of a few books as well as a sequence or string of events to show deeper relationships in everyday occurrences. The idea is to apply a sub-surface perspective to life's routine; or in Environmental Ethics terms, "deep ecology." Anyway, I checked out Phar-Lap on the world wide web, and I was mistaken, Walter Farley was not the pen behind that horse. Of course, it has been since fifth grade that I read these race horse stories. The book, "A Horse Named Phar-Lap," was written by David Williamson. Phar-Lap, which translates from the Thai word for lightning or sky flash, was born in New Zealand during the Great Depression Era. After winning 36 races in Australia he suddenly became ill and died. Interestingly enough the horse's heart was "taken" out as the cause of death was not certain. The 6.3 kg heart (2 times the average size) was kept on display at the National Institute of Anatomy. In 2006, Australian Synchrotron scientists determined that it was a single large dose of arsenic that killed Phar-Lap.

The synchronicity between this particular horse and the events in "When the Impossible Happens" are

remarkable. The land marks, the Hermitage of the Immaculate Heart (where the 160,000 acre fire was), and the Ventana Inn also had significance in relationship to the horse Phar-Lap, having eyes that perceive a full 360 degrees and a giant heart on display; or on fire in the case of the Ventana Wilderness. I also learned by word of mouth from a survivor's family member that the Ventana fire was started by lightning. Previously, I used Ventana (the Spanish word for window) to compare eyes as windows to the soul, and quoted what Groff had stated that Einstein had encouraged Jung to pursue his ideas of synchronicity because it coincided with new findings in physics. The new findings in physics Einstein was talking about must have been null physics; as a horse sees it, that is everything behind you and in front of you all at the same time. If you play with the word and switch the h in the word "heart" it spells Earth.

It's interesting how one idea can lead to another. The initial inspiration for my two essays came by way of the New York Times. I was crumpling it up to use for fire starter when I chanced by a Farley in the obituaries, "a Powers model, artist, and writer married to Walter Farley, author of the Black Stallion series". This was the beginning of a fascinating journey that took me all the way to Phar-Lap. And of course, it is the journey, and not the end, that we all seek.
